We are very happy to announce that in partnership with the Williamson County Historical Society we have created an online database for burials in Williamson County. Many will be familiar with the three volumes titled, "Directory of Williamson County Burials," produced by the Williamson County Historical Society. (Sometimes called "Burial Books," "Cemetery Books") The first compilation of burials was published in the Review Appeal in 1967 by then County Historian Col. Campbell Brown and the last supplement was issued in 1996.

Our online Burial Directory contains all the information from the 3 volumes and the supplements plus the additions and corrections collected after 1996. We will continue to collect information and update the directory as cemeteries are surveyed. Please contact us with any new information or corrections. This marks the completion of the first phase of our Cemetery Survey Project.

As President of the Williamson County Historical Society, I look forward to seeing the three volumes of **Directory of Williamson County Burials** available to all citizens online through the Williamson County Archives site. The Society, under the leadership of Col. Campbell Brown, then county historian, began recording cemeteries across Williamson County in the mid-1960s. Col. Brown ended his forward to **Volume I** in 1973 with these words: "In the belief and hope that this information will be useful to all the residents of this county, and to historians and genealogists in the county at large, this publication is presented by the Williamson County Historical Society." His words still ring true.

Mrs. Herman Major oversaw the collecting of information for Volume II, which mainly covered Mt. Hope Cemetery and Volume III, which attempted to make corrections and additions to the first two volumes, plus finishing the survey for cemeteries across the county. Mrs. Major had the cooperation of an army of volunteers who searched the hills and hollows for family cemeteries. We owe a word of thanks to these workers and scouts for braving the briars, chiggers and ticks to record over eight hundred cemeteries in Williamson County.

The Williamson County Historical Society grants permission to place these three volumes online under the direction of the Williamson County Archives.

Location Of Williamson County Cemeteries Reported

The following list of cemeteries in Williamson County was submitted to the Review-Appal by County Historian, Col. Campbell H. Brown. This list, comprising from one-half to two-thirds of all cemeteries within the county, contains those on which information has been compiled as to the burial therein, by interested and knowledgeable citizens.

A large-scale map of the county, showing the majority of all cemeteries is on display in the office of the County Superintendent of Education. In the near future Col. Brown advised, the cemeteries already included in the census will be checked off on this map.

ALLEN CEMETERY—1st District—turn South on Crow Cut Road, two miles turn West on Forest Glenn Road, 500 feet on right.

ANDREWS CEMETERY—5th District, two miles West of Franklin on Boyd Mill Pike, R. S. McCandless Farm.

EPHRAIM ANDREWS CEMETERY—11th District; eight miles Southeast of Franklin, U.S. 41, on Aubrey Stone place. Formerly Sam Fleming place.

EPHRAIM ANDREWS CEMETERY—12th District—vic. of Bethesda, George Andrews Cemetery—11th District; Bethesda Road, just beyond Stone place on Lawrence Road place.

MARK MONTGOMERY ANDREWS CEMETERY—12th District; ten miles South of Franklin, U.S. 31. (Mrs. Forrest Andrews, Knoxville, Tennessee).

ANGON CEMETERY—1st District—North of Pinewood Road, 1 1/2 miles West from junction of Valley Road.

ANTHONY CEMETERY—11th District, U.S. 31, just to the South of front gate of Toss Hill place. Formerly the Trammell place.

TRIMSTROM CEMETERY—6th District—Columbus Road, on Robert H. Adair Farm.

BESSY ARMSTRONG CEMETERY—7th District; Hillsboro Road, U.S. 41, 6/4 or 7 miles North of Franklin.

BALLOU CEMETERY—4th District; West of U.S. 41 via Murray Lane, South to Holly Tree Gap, then West to Robert Amos Farm. Formerly Ballow Farm.

BEECH HUBBARD CEMETERY—1st District—turn South on Chester Road, 1 1/2 miles on East side.

BIGGS CEMETERY—21st District; on farm of Robert Biggers, between Arno and Allison.

BOND CEMETERY—4th District; on Buckner Lane, behind house first lane on right after turning Thompson Station Road. Place lived in by Mr. Anglin, owned by Don Cameron.

BOYD CEMETERY—21st District; on the Boyd Farm, now Nickson's, near Bingham.

BRADLEY CEMETERY—8th District; off Old Hillsboro Road in Bradley's Road, Mrs. Jim Moran's Farm.

BROOKS CEMETERY—15th District; Cox Pike, on the John Vaden Farm.

KING CEMETERY—1st District; 6 1/2 miles S.E. to Fernvale, turn West on Casey Fork Road, 1/4 mile on left.

KING FAMILY CEMETERY—18th District; ten miles East of Franklin.

LAZENBY CEMETERY—7th District; on Murray Lane, on John Sugg property opposite house of Albert Mervelle.

LESTER CEMETERY—2nd District; near Flat Creek.

MALLOY FAMILY CEMETERY—15th District; on Malloy Road, four miles North of Franklin.

MANGRUM CEMETERY—1st District; turn East on State 96—1/4 mile on South side.

MANLEY CEMETERY No. 1—7th District; on Beech Creek Road, property of heirs of Dr. Bryant.

MANLEY CEMETERY No. 2—7th District; Beech Creek Road, on property of Charles Cartmell.

MAURY-BOXLEY CEMETERY—8th District; West end of Blazer Road.

MAURY FAMILY CEMETERY—9th District; on Del Rio Road, two miles Northwest of Franklin, Will Reese Farm.

MCCLAIN CEMETERY—Cherokee Community.

MCCLINTON CEMETERY—7th District; Williamson County, on the South side of Old Hickory Blvd. between Hillsboro Road and Highway 106—on Johnson Vaughn Farm.

MCCLINTON CEMETERY—7th District; Hillsboro Road, less than a mile from Williamson-Davidson County Line, on Madison Jones Farm.

MCANIEL CEMETERY—15th District; U.S. 31—in the back yard of a fairly new brick house just South of Mr. Sam Richardson's Farm, off from Baptist Church.

MCLEWIS CEMETERY—15th District; 2 1/2 miles North of Franklin, on U.S. 31, mile East.

MCLEWIS CEMETERY—6th District; two miles North of Seese Road on the Fountain Ballow Farm.

MCLEWIS CEMETERY—8th District; on Berry's Chapel Road, often known as Cotton Road or Lane, Dillard Jacob Farm.

MCLEWIS CEMETERY—16th District; 1/2 mile near Brentwood Country Club.

"Julius Caesar" To Be Presented Here

When the National Shakespeare Company performs *Julius Caesar* at 1:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. at Franklin High School on Thursday, January 26, the audience will be viewing a company making American theatrical history. As America's only cross-country touring company, the troupe has in four years become the most widely traveled Shakespeare group ever to tour the United States. Last season alone, it logged more than 30,000 miles in an extensive eight-month tour of 35 states. Over 200 performances were given in 100 cities, secondary school and civic centers.

The 1936-37 season will see the Company expand its tour to 28 weeks with plans for a summer festival. The National Shakespeare Company's productions here are being sponsored by the English Department of Franklin High School and the Battle Ground Academy, and tickets may be obtained at either school, at Gray Drug Co., and Sandlin Drug Co.

Although theatrical ventures are among the riskiest to undertake, founders, producer-director Philip Helder and actress Elaine Sulka felt it essential to "bring quality productions of culturally significant dramatic literature to the masses."

Last year, Miss Sulka and Mr. Helder realized their ambition of performing nationwide. The company has received enthusiastic response from both the profession and the public. One critic from New York wrote that the National Shakespeare Company "is making a tremendous contribution to our literary heritage, our language, and our young people."

Similarly, an enthusiastic educator in Illinois remarked, "After seeing the Company, never again will my students feel that Shakespeare is a book. He has become a vibrant and significant force in their lives."

WALKER CEMETERY—15th District; Southeast end of Walker Road, near Cross Keys.

WATSON CEMETERY—7th District; near house of Mrs. B. F. Moore on U.S. 41—South of jet, with Beech Creek Road.

GEORGE WHITE CEMETERY—21st District; near Allison.

WIGGINS CEMETERY—7th District; on U.S. 41, South of jet, with Murray Lane, on farm of John Sugg.

WILLAS CEMETERY—22nd District; West of Mt. Zion Church, near Cross Keys.

WILLIAMS CEMETERY—10th District; 1 1/2 miles South of Harpeth School.

WILLIAMS-ELBECK CEMETERY—8th District; Malloy Road, on farm of W. W. Cook.

WILSON CEMETERY—7th District; on Manley Lane, East of its junction with U.S. 41—on property formerly owned by Mr. and Mrs. Greer Heber.

WILSON CEMETERY—14th District; in Mr. S. S. Wilson's yard on Wilson Pike.

WILSON CEMETERY—14th District; Clovercroft Road on John Hooker Farm, two miles Northeast of jet, with Wilson Pike.

SHARPE CEMETERY—18th District; two miles West of Franklin, on Boyd Mill Pike, R. S. McCandless Farm.

MAJOR ANTHONY SHARPE CEMETERY—8th District; Boyd Mill Pike, opposite house of Dudley Casey.

SHORT CEMETERY—6th District; Justice Hyde Farm, Old Charlotte Road—1/4 mile off Old Hillsboro Road.

SHORT-POYNOR CEMETERY—6th District; off Hillsboro Road, on East side after passing Bingham. The old Poyner Home, now owned by E. Hogan.

SRUMATE CEMETERY—10th District; Southeast of Franklin, U.S. 41, back of Fred F. Frazier's home.

SHY CEMETERY—8th District; on Del Rio Pike at the corner of Berry's Chapel or Cotton Road. Farm of Mrs. Ed. Green and her daughter, and Mrs. and Mr. Jim Buford.

SMITH CEMETERY—1st District; West side of junction State 96 and Casey Fork Road—200 feet on 96—South side, off road.

SMITHSON CEMETERY—12th District; Bethesda Road.

SOUTH CEMETERY—7th District; Bethesda Road.

SOUTH HARVEY CHURCH OF CHRIST CEMETERY—1st District; Highway 106—South of Linton.

SPENCER CEMETERY—7th District; Manley Lane, East of U.S. 41.

STOCKETT CEMETERY—7th District; Seese Road, at jet, with Seese Road, on farm of Mrs. W. W. Magill.

STONE FAMILY CEMETERY—8th District; six miles West of Franklin, on Boyd Mill Road.
